

representative to the Boys' Club of America, who presented a Certificate of Merit to the group of new brothers for the work they had done for the Bloomington Boys' Club. Brother Ronald Miller received the Best Pledge Award, while the Best Active Award went to Brother Ross. The address was given by Dean of Students Robert H. Shaffer, who praised the fraternity for its rapid growth.

A Chi Phi team composed of Brothers Craft and Montgomery entered the 1960 Campus Quiz Bowl. On April 8, the Chi Phis won the championship by defeating the Kappa Sigma Fraternity, 2200-950. This victory, built on the highest score ever registered in this contest, brought the fraternity its first traveling trophy.

In April, the Chi Phi Little 500 team qualified fourth for the May 14 race. The Kappa Delta Sorority and Harlos Construction Company were the coed and financial sponsors for the Chi Phi team.

In an effort to improve the scholarship of the house, the Chi Phi Fraternity did not enter either the 1960 Teke Chariot Race or the I.U. Sing. However, Iota Delta was represented at the "Sing" by Brothers Jones and Kavadas as masters-of-ceremonies. Also, "Two Chi's and a Phi," an instrumental trio composed of Brother Carter on drums, Brother Gansinger on piano, and Pledge John Noennig on bass, performed at this annual event.

An oriental theme was used for the second annual spring

formal dance which was held on May 7, 1960, at the Bloomington National Guard Armory. A formal dinner served at the Skyland Lodge in Spencer, Indiana, preceded the dance.

On May 14, 1960, the Chi Phi team finished the Little 500 race in sixth position. Brothers Meyer, Neff, Ross, and Simpson were members of the 1960 team. Again, the fraternity hosted a large number of parents, and that evening the mothers had the chance to see how good their respective son's bed felt. The annual Little 500-Mother's Day Banquet was held in the fraternity house on May 15, and they gave the chapter a stereophonic record player and six lawn chairs on this weekend. Earlier in the semester they had given the fraternity new drapes for the living room. The officers elected at this meeting were:

Later Mrs. Ray assumed the presidency upon the resignation of Mrs. Duckworth and similarly Mrs. Hodson, mother of Pledge Thomas Hodson, became the new secretary.

Late in the semester the alumni adviser, Calvin S. Hamilton, along with Brothers Deganutti, Ross, and Cuttino, met with Mr. J. A. Franklin, vice-president and treasurer of Indiana University. They presented Mr. Franklin a check for \$1,000 as down-payment on the lot for the proposed new Chi Phi House. As previously agreed the lot was located in the new Fraternity

Subdivision at the northeast corner of Jordan Avenue and 17th Street.

Individually, several Chi Phis were active in campus leadership during the spring semester. Brother Arnold was elected president of the Falcon Club for the 1960-61 school year; the Cosmopolitan Club appointed Brother Frenz to the same office in that organization. Brother Russ was in charge of the agenda for the Little United Nations Assembly on March 10-11-12 and was elected on April 8 to a seat in the 1960-61 Student Senate, representing the Third Street I district. Also, on April 21-22-23, he was one of the two representatives of the Indiana University Inter Fraternity Council who attended the Big Ten Panhellenic and Inter Fraternity Council convention at the University of Minnesota; Brother Russ was elected secretary of the Inter Fraternity Council for the spring semester, 1960. In addition, he served on the steering committee of the 1960 Campus Quiz Bowl. Brother Canine was given a Union Service Award for outstanding work at the Indiana Memorial Union. Pledge Robert Helt was appointed to Phi Eta Sigma, scholastic honorary. Brother Doster completed four years as a member of the Indiana University Marching 100, and Pledge John Noennig was a member of the Indiana University Philharmonic Orchestra. Brother Jones was selected for membership in the journalism honorary, Sigma Delta Chi.

In spring intramural activities the chapter won the league championship and finished second in all-campus compe-

tition in bowling, a league championship in baseball, and second place in the intramural track meet.

Mr. Richard Holmes asked to be relieved of his position as faculty adviser to Iota Delta due to his withdrawal from school. A replacement to Mr. Holmes was not named immediately.

Brothers Deganutti and Ronald Miller were selected to be the Iota Delta representatives to the 1960 Congress.

Two Sparks Memorial Medals were given to Iota Delta members in 1960. Both Brothers Montgomery and Russ had earned perfect 3.0 indices for the year, so the National Office made the unusual decision to award two scholarship medals. For the fourth consecutive semester, the chapter improved on its previous scholastic standing, in comparison with the Indiana University fraternities. With a house average of 1.54, the Chi Phis ranked sixth on campus and were awarded the Inter Fraternity Council's trophy for greatest scholastic improvement.

The second annual Senior Banquet was held in mid-May, 1960.

Summer rush parties were held at the chapter house and at Brother Carter's cottage on Lake Freeman.

The 1960 Chi Phi Congress was held in Atlanta, Georgia. The Iota Delta Chapter received the Greatest Scholastic Improvement Award from the National Office for their academic progress of the previous semester. The award of \$100 was presented to the Alpha, Brother Deganutti.

At the outset of the fall semester, 1960, Brother Deganutti resigned from the office of Alpha. Therefore, chapter elections were held for the council offices.

Twenty-one men were pledged to Chi Phi in the fall semester, 1960. Brother Boxell was rush chairman.

The fall initiation ceremonies were completed on October 16, 1960. Sixteen men were added to the brotherhood.

At the Initiation Banquet, Brother Beaumont was given the Best Pledge Award, and Brother Neff was presented the Best Active Award. The toastmaster, Brother Hawkins, introduced Mr. Robert Matson, the Director of Fraternity Affairs, who gave the main address.

The second issue of the chapter newsletter, The Frangipani, was published during mid-October, 1960.

"We Dedicate These Spartans To Thee, Almighty Stadium." Using this slogan and with a replica of half the new Indiana University football stadium, including a card section spelling out "Host 'Em and Roast 'Em" in the background, the Chi Phi Fraternity won the grand prize in the Homecoming Decoration Contest on October 22, 1960. As a center for the display, a Crimson Bull turned a Michigan State Spartan over a smoking spit. A taped recording of Indiana University cheers and songs was played in the background. At the Homecoming Variety Show, Brother Cook, the chairman of the display, was presented the first place trophy for the Organized Division and the Grand Prize Trophy. Thus, at this time the Iota Delta Chapter owned

three traveling trophies--from Campus Quiz Bowl, scholarship improvement, and Homecoming decorations. This Homecoming weekend marked the first time which the Iota Delta Chapter officially played host to its own alumni.

Due to his increasing job responsibilities, Brother Calvin S. Hamilton resigned as alumni adviser to the chapter in November, 1960. Shortly thereafter, Brother Roy Mitchell, who had graduated in 1959, was selected as chapter adviser.

The Chi Phi Fraternity and Alpha Omicron Pi Sorority built a booth, "Channel Capers," for the 1960 Fall Carnival. The booth resembled a television set, with caricatures of popular television shows staged inside. "Let Beaumont Be Your Beau" was the slogan advertising Brother Beaumont for Bachelor of the Year candidate.

The third annual pledge dance was held on December 10, 1960. An underwater theme was used, the house having been decorated as a sub-surface playland, complete with 12 tons of sand in the TV room.

The third issue of The Frangipani was issued in December, 1960.

Campus leadership was demonstrated by a number of Chi Phis in various campus activities. Brother Russ was general chairman of the 1960 Fall Carnival, and he was appointed to Indiana University's highest honoraries for men--the Board of Aeons and Blue Key. The 1961 I.U. Foundation named Brothers Cook, Gordon, Ross, and Russ as members. Brother Dorman Ray

was president of the Protestant Student Council, Pledge William Montgomery served as editor of the freshman newspaper, and Pledge Richard Gribble was on the steering committee of Christmas Eve On Campus, in addition to being Tower Center's candidate for Bachelor of the Year.

The Chi Phi bowling team for the fall semester was runner-up in campus intramural playoffs, after having again won its league. Brothers Fogle and Gouveia were members of the 1960 Indiana University soccer team.

Scholastically, the Iota Delta Chapter ranked 12th for the fall semester, 1960.

A strong rush program in the spring semester netted 26 new pledges for the Chi Phi Fraternity.

The Chi Phis entered the Campus Quiz Bowl in February, with a team composed of Brothers Frenz, Gaines, Helt, and Russ. After having won its first three matches, the Iota Delta team was eliminated in the semi-final round, being one of the last

two teams eliminated from an original field of 32.

Brother Gladfelter visited the chapter on February 17 and 18. He helped further the plans for a fund raising drive for the new fraternity house. It was anticipated at this time that a new house could be occupied in September, 1963.

The second annual Roman Holiday Dance was held on February 25, 1961. Several brothers from Sigma Chapter were guests at the dance.

In the first week of March, Chi Phi and the Kappa Kappa Gamma Sorority engaged in the I.U. Sing competition. With Brother Noennig as song leader, the two groups entered the Mixed Choral Division with a version of "The Seine," a part of which was sung in French.

Initiation ceremonies were conducted on March 26, 1961, for 11 men.

Brother Connell was presented the Best Pledge Award at the Initiation Banquet, while Brother Gaines received the Best Active Award. Brother Dorman Ray, the toastmaster, introduced Brother Darryl McCall, an alumnus of the Gamma (Emory University) and Theta Delta (University of Florida) Chapters. In

his address Brother McCall spoke on his experiences as an undergraduate member of the Chi Phi Fraternity and how his fraternity experiences had benefitted him. A member of the DePauw University faculty, Dr. McCall presented the chapter a copy of The Chronicles of Chi Phi, in honor of the new brothers. Brothers Connell and Montgomery scored 100 per cent on their national pledge examinations, becoming the first men to do so in the history of the chapter. Brother Montgomery's initiation was the first time in the history of Iota Delta that two members of the same family had become active members of the chapter.

During Greek Week the Chi Phis and the Alpha Phi Sorority entered the 1961 Teke Chariot Race and finished in fourth place. Also, a Chi Phi team entered the Greek Week Tug Of War Contest.

The newly formed Indiana Chi Phi Alumni Association held its first meeting on April 15, 1961, in Indianapolis. Nine directors were placed in office after mail balloting of Chi Phi alumni living in Indiana and Kentucky. The first alumni board of directors was:
